Maria Curie-Skłodowska University is the largest public academic institution in Eastern Poland, located in Lublin, an academic city of various cultures and traditions. ## Why are International Relations worth studying?

International Relations is a subject for those who wish to combine a thirst for knowledge with personal development while also creating opportunities for attractive future employment. We offer interdisciplinary study aimed especially at people interested in the world around them and the processes shaping it. International relations are activities, processes, and events of a transborder nature, which means they are not contained within states' boundaries. Nowadays, globalization and integration processes require that anyone involved in politics, business, culture, or social life be familiar with international relations. Therefore, the demand for academic knowledge of the subject is increasing, which translates into good prospects for **attractive employment**. Among the numerous work possibilities available for our graduates are diplomacy, international trade, international projects, and international organizations.

In order to meet the growing demand for specialists in international relations, the Faculty of Political Science at Maria Curie-Skłodowska University will for the first time in the 2015-16 academic year enroll students in a **2-year full-time English-language MA programme in International Relations**. Due to the fact that the entire programme will be conducted in English, students will be able to master their language skills and enrich their vocabulary with specialist terminology while expanding their knowledge of international relations. The programme is designed **for both Polish and foreign students** who wish to probe the problem of international relations, especially in the context of Central and Eastern European relations.

Our development is in line with students' expectations – we are open to students' and graduates' suggestions. Answering students' needs, we are planning to expand our programme by introducing language courses in Central and Eastern Europe languages.

The programme has a **unique content**. The syllabus combines study of general issues in modern international relations with detailed studies of Central and Eastern Europe that include both historical background and contemporary social, political, economic, and cultural issues. This region has witnessed profound socio-economic changes and is rapidly gaining importance in modern international relations.

We do care about our graduates' future. We have started cooperation with partner universities. We are striving to provide our students with prestige diplomas from two universities.

#### **MA International Relations Graduate Profile**

The students who have completed a second degree in International Relations will have acquired an education at an advanced level, including both specialist knowledge and general intellectual skills that equip them for employment, citizenship and personal development.

# We expect our graduate to have the following attributes:

- to have expanded in comparison with the first degree interdisciplinary knowledge in the area of international relations, especially in the fields of international economic, social, political and legal issues;
- to understand complex transnational issues;
- to understand specific aspects of central and eastern Europe history, political systems, culture and security challenges;
- to know the theory and practice of international relations as well as the theory and practice of political and economic decision-making processes;
- to have the necessary methodological and analytical skills to take up employment in positions requiring rational and accurate assessments, and to have instilled habits of personal responsibility;
- to be prepared for work in, among other areas, diplomacy, international organizations and institutions, government entities involved in foreign and economic policy, think tanks and research centres, dealing with international relations, companies related to international trade, as well as in the media press, radio and television;
- to have instilled habits of lifelong learning and professional development, and to be prepared for study for the third degree (doctoral studies).

## The Campus

The UMCS campus is a complex of buildings situated in the immediate vicinity of the University's teaching buildings. It compromises the UMCS dormitories, private dormitories offering rooms for students, and the UMCS Academic Sports Centre, which consists of three sports halls, an indoor swimming pool, two bodybuilding gyms, an aerobics room and a remedial gymnastics room. The centre also has a new multifunction field with artificial turf and lighting and two beach volleyball courts as well as two tennis courts. #### **Dormitories**

UMCS currently has nine dormitories located in close proximity to the city cen-tre (a total of 2600 beds). We offer various types of rooms: two-room segments with a kitchen and a bathroom (independent flats), 1-4 room segments with one bathroom, 3-person rooms with common bathrooms in the corridor. We offer single, double (majority of rooms), and 3-person rooms. Each dormitory has an entertainment room, a TV room, laundry, and "quiet study rooms". Each room has access to Internet. Moreover, the university also has rooms for part-time and extramural students coming to Lublin for a few nights a month. # Why Lublin?

First, we can boast of a long-standing tradition and substantial experience in teaching International Relations. Our staff is composed of **highly-specialised teachers** in such areas as international relations, socio-economical, cultural, and political life in Central and Eastern Europe. Included among **our professors are native speakers of English.** 

Second, Lublin is an **an exceptional city in which to study international relations** with a focus on Central and Eastern Europe. The city has a 700-yearlong history of being a contact point for cultures and religions in Central and Eastern Europe. It is here that the Polish-Lithuanian Union was signed in 1569; this had durable cultural results that outlasted the political consequences and laid the ideological foundations for today's European Union. Therefore, Lublin played an important role in the history of Europe in the period between the two unions.

Third, Lublin is well known for its great **academic traditions**. With 80,000 students, the city provides a **conducive atmosphere for studying**. The Faculty of Political Science hosts the greatest number of foreign students of all faculties of Maria Curie-Sklodowska University, and naturally provides the experience of multi-cultural society.

Last but not least, Lublin is **easily accessible.** The city is constantly developing; it has an airport and the road infrastructure is being improved. At the same time Lublin is a comparatively affordable place to live, offering numerous flats and university campuses, as well as places of recreation.



## Cost of living in Lublin

Lublin, despite being a large university center, is characterized by a low cost of living as compared with cities in Central and Western Poland. Fees for accommodation in a UMCS dormitory range from PLN 270 to PLN 550 per month. The monthly cost of living in a private dormitory (in close proximity to the teaching buildings) or renting a room in a student flat is PLN 550 on average.

The city's public transport (buses and trolleybuses) is not expensive as students pay reduced fares – PLN 1.40. Food prices in Lublin are also lower than in the largest cities in Poland. The cheapest places to shop are supermarkets and discount stores, while small stores are more expensive.
